Every Sunday is Easter Sunday!

I have a question for your consideration: Isn't that statement at the top of this article the reality behind every single Sunday morning worship service? Certainly, that was the rationale behind the Early Church's decision to hold the commemoration and celebration of Jesus' resurrection on "the first day of the week," isn't it? Easter joy and remembrance 52 times per year... that's not a bad idea, right? I mention all this because I want you to consider something in connection with the possibility of the disruption of our regular Easter morning activities this year. Since we know that April 12th will not provide us the opportunity for a normal schedule, would you please give some thought to an alternative I heard about several days ago from a fellow minister -- "we are proceeding with plans for a full Easter celebration whether that's in May, or June, or September, or November... whenever we can again gather to sing and pray and listen to God's Word together as His Family."

When that happens, "Alleluias" will again ring out with our joyful voices in our Sanctuary and from those across Chattanooga and around the world. As we move closer to Holy Week and consider the last days of our Savior's life, some of those great hymns of Christendom come to mind with their profound messages: "Ride On, Ride On in Majesty," "Go to Dark Gethsemane," "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded," "Were You There." And then remembering that first Easter morning, we turn to hymns like "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today," "I Know That My Redeemer Lives," "O Sons and Daughters of the King," "The Day of Resurrection," and "He's Risen, He's Risen."

What a message of hope and reassurance those wonderful lyrics provide us as they lift up Scriptural truths, under scoring them for us in meaningful and memorable words and phrases. I'm sure that you are as excited as I am to join with our brothers and sisters here at Cross of Christ, in raising our voices to the Lord in "Hosanna's and Hallelujahs" to our Savior and King.

As we await that day of gathering again, may the Lord continue to bless us through our on-line worship, our Lenten devotions, and our mutual encouragement by email, text and phone.

My dear daughters and sons of the resurrection, let us remain steadfast in our praise to our Heavenly Father and united by our Savior's blood, as the Holy Spirit fills us with hope and joy!

The online service will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Palm Sunday. We have palms that can be picked up on Friday (tomorrow) or Saturday in anticipation of our Palm Sunday service. They will be located in the breezeway by the office entrance, along with the smaller lapel-size palm crosses. Please take only one (1) of the large palms per family or if you have children, one (1) per child. PLEASE fold over the end of the bag after you have taken out the leaf and reclip the bag, to keep the palms supple.

The palms will survive in a well-lit air-conditioned space, but do not put near a heat source or in direct sunlight. Brown tips are a natural feature of a healthy palm leaf. When you get home, cut the stem at a 45-degree angle above the bottom end of the stem. Place in cold water. You can also place it in ICE WATER for 1-3 hours if your leaves are tightly folded or "closed', as this will open up the leaves.

A smaller palm cross for each member of your family can also be picked up.

(The April-June Portals of Prayer are also in the breezeway if you haven't picked one up. Just be sure to hear the click on each end of the white plastic box after you take out a book, which means the lid is securely on and won't fly away.)



The online service will begin at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 9th. At the conclusion of the service, Pastor will be stripping the altar while Matt reads Psalm 88, as we begin to think about the Good Friday service and the Easter service to follow.

Some of you have asked about having private communion during Holy Week. After much prayer and deliberation with our Elders and congregational president, (taking in the current pandemic circumstances, and the "Stay-at-Home" Order from Governor Lee and the recent "Shelter-in-Place" Order by Mayor Berke), we will be like other LCMS congregations who have determined that this should be suspended for a time, out of love for those who might contract the deadly Covid-19 virus.

We acknowledge that this is a hardship, but at other times in history, Lutherans often went weeks or months without the Lord's Supper, such as during the early years of frontier America, when congregations were without a Pastor for lengthy time periods. And, in the early 20th century during the great influenza epidemic of 1918-1919, many Missouri Synod churches were not able to meet for any services during a period of time. We want to continue

to promote and encourage the proper practice of the Lord's Supper in faithfulness to the teaching and example of Christ. We are not in uncharted territory as noted here. What is new though are the blessings we have with modern technology and the ability to share our services with each other at the same time.

It is best said from a document that we received from our LCMS Headquarters in St. Louis... "As great as the hardship is when we cannot receive Christ's body and blood, the hardship ought not be "resolved" in ways that promise an uncertain "sacrament" without the absolute assurance that Christ intends. It is better humbly and repentantly to ask the Lord for the regular administration of the Sacrament of the Altar to be restored to us, together with an end to the "deadly pestilence" that is killing thousands of souls who are precious to God, their Creator" (see Psalm 91; Jonah 4:11).



The online service will begin at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, April 10th. (There will not be a noon time service.) At the conclusion of the service, Pastor asks us to maintain a time of silence while we think about Christ's death on the cross. We pray that our worship this day will help us grasp the enormous love and compassion our Savior has for each of us.



The online Easter Celebration will begin at 9:00 a.m. next Sunday, April 12th. As noted on the previous page in Pastor's Letter, we are already proceeding with plans for a full Easter celebration in the future, whether that's in May, or June, or September, or November... whenever we can again gather to sing, pray and listen to God's Word together as His Family, along with celebrating the Lord's Supper in the company of other Christians. There then will be "Alleluia's" ringing out from our doors and windows from the joyful voices in our Sanctuary. We can already anticipate the excitement in our hearts as we think about that time when we will join with our brothers and sisters here at Cross of Christ. We will celebrate the day with our voices and spirits raising in "Hosanna's and Hallelujah's" to our Savior and King, as the assembly of Cross of Christ comes back together.

Loosed From Death...



Almost 100 years ago, one-time U.K. poet laureate John Masefield wrote a play called The Trial of Jesus. In it, the centurion who oversaw Jesus' execution returns to give Pontius Pilate an official report. When Pilate's wife requests and receives details about the crucifixion, she asks, "Do you think he is dead?" Despite what he had witnessed, the centurion answers, "No, lady, I don't."

Confused, Pilate's wife inquires, "Then where is he?" The man's response: "Let loose in the world, where none can stop his truth."

Indeed, as 2 Timothy 2:9 (ESV) attests, "The word of God is not bound!"

Easter Around The World...

Easter traditions are important, but they vary widely. While Americans dye hardboiled eggs, Kenyans carve soapstone eggs and present them as gifts in banana-fiber boxes. In Bermuda, locals fly homemade kites on Good Friday — a tradition that began when a teacher illustrated Christ's ascension to heaven using a crossshaped kite.

Ethiopian Christians observe a 56-day fast from meat and all animal products. On Easter, they dress in white to worship in churches decorated with handmade fabric. Then they feast with non-Christians on roast chicken, goat and rice.

In France, church bells are silent between Holy Thursday and Easter to observe Jesus' Passion. According to legend, the bells grow wings and fly to Rome to be blessed, returning on Easter with chocolate and presents. In one town's main square, chefs make a giant omelet with 4,500 eggs to feed 1,000 people!

A Reason To Laugh...

The week after Easter, some churches observe Holy Humor Sunday — a tradition dating back to the fourth century. Early Christian theologians coined the term "risus paschalis," or "the Easter laugh," saying God played the supreme joke on death. Some believers celebrated Bright Monday, gathering the day after Easter to mock Satan's defeat.

On the first day of April, remember that "we are fools for Christ" (1 Corinthians 4:10, NIV). Then later in the month, take time to smile and laugh, knowing that victory is yours, thanks to Jesus.
