

SOMETHING DIFFERENT TO CONSIDER

In the midst of the abundance of good and timely articles written in response to the impacts of the coronavirus and various recommendations on dealing with it, I have decided to go another direction with this article, based on a story told in one of my seminary classes.

Please consider these two (2) brief scenarios:

- 1) A pastor was approached by a man who expressed a desire to become a member of the congregation. He went on to say that he was a busy person and therefore "did not want to be called upon for any service project or committee work, for teaching or attending Sunday School, or for singing in the choir. I want to be spared any involvement that will take much time or effort, and also, do not expect me in worship too often." The pastor thought for a moment and then replied, "I believe you are at the wrong church... the one you want is three blocks down this street." So, the man followed the pastor's directions and soon came to an abandoned, boarded-up, overgrown, church building... in short, a dead church.
- 2) Psalm 1:3 describes another person who is "like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither, and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper." Such an individual has put his faith in Christ and has sunk his roots deep into the promises of Almighty God; and in the assurance of those promises, he has found the power that has transformed his life. Such a person (whose life remains rooted in Jesus and whose innermost thoughts go back again and again to the sure foundation of the Holy Spirit's words) is in daily contact with a source of power that brings new life in unlimited abundance. Such a life will leaf and flower and fruit with Christian virtues that will bring sweetness and comfort and joy to the hearts and needs of others... then along with other ever-bearing trees in the Garden of God, the world can experience the goodness and bounty of His love.

Statement on the death of George Floyd and the ensuing riots

Discriminatory treatment of human beings on the basis of race is irrational evil and results in evil. It is folly, which can produce only anger and hatred. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." America's original sin of legal racism, the denial of human rights based on race, has reaped the whirlwind.

God's Word rejects racism. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). "No one is righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10). "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). All are equally created by God. All are equally accountable to God. The sins of all are equally atoned for by Christ. All are equally precious to God. Racial animosity is the result of sin and is sin in itself. Racism is not acceptable in the church. Jesus Himself bids us love our neighbors as ourselves (Mark 12:31) and did so precisely while rejecting racial preference (cf. Good Samaritan, Luke 10:25–37).

Unity in the church according to the Augsburg Confession is defined by Article VII: "For it is sufficient for the true unity of the Christian church that the Gospel be preached ... and that the sacraments be administered in accordance with the divine Word." Christ and His gifts bring unity and equity in the church. Racial discrimination in or by the church is sin. Racial conflict in our nation calls every Christian to introspection. "It is time for judgment to begin at the household of God" (1 Peter 4:17). "Righteous indignation" without self-reflection and repentance is meaningless, or worse, hypocrisy.

The one who grievously and unjustly took the sacred gift of life from George Floyd — resulting in a charge of 3rd-degree murder — will, ironically, be given the very thing he denied his victim, due process of the law. Justice must be meted out according to the law. Others may be charged.

We weep for George Floyd, for his family and loved ones because he was robbed of life. We weep for our nation. We weep for those across our nation who believe their only recourse is destruction. We weep for police officers everywhere, who carry out their honorable vocations with courage and goodwill but find their task infinitely more challenging and dangerous in the wake of the sad events in Minneapolis. We pray for the safety of all and the welfare of those who have lost property and livelihood. We pray for

the police who must stand against mayhem. We support the First Amendment rights of the peaceful protestors.

We deplore injustice. We deplore destruction, robbery and doing physical harm to others. That, too, is injustice. We plead to citizens and governments of this nation for communities beset by poverty, crime and injustice. We plead for rational and unifying policies that will end injustices and address social breakdown, lack of economic access, and other factors that fuel anger, hatred and dissension.

We shall pray, but we shall do even more. We shall follow the ancient mandate of the prophet of Yahweh: "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).

And we shall proclaim Christ, "in season and out of season" (2 Timothy 4:2). "For one will scarcely die for a righteous person — though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die — but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7–8).

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. On account of these the wrath of God is coming. In these you too once walked, when you were living in them. But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all.

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him (Colossians 3:1–17 ESV).

Since December 2019, Matt Doebler has been donating CoC the use of his camera and video equipment as we undertook an Outreach Video Ministry for our homebound members and the community. What a blessing this has been since COVID-19 has hit the nation! This ministry has been reaching hundreds of people in our congregation, community, and across many states during this time. (e.g. Maundy Thursday, 387 views; Good Friday, 252 views; and Easter Sunday 475 views!! Since Easter, we are averaging approx. 108 views.) We want and need this outreach ministry to continue moving forward.

Matt, Natalie, Jack, and Chloe will soon be moving (later this month), onto a new chapter in their lives in Saint Louis, as Matt studies to become a pastor at Concordia Seminary. And unfortunately, as Matt leaves, also goes the video equipment! We are currently in the process of ordering the equipment needed, per Matt's excellent suggestions and guidance. We also have a couple members that will be shadowing Matt for the next two weeks at worship services; learning how to setup, operate video, and put together the worship service for our online viewers.

We are therefore undertaking an Outreach Video Ministry Fundraiser, with a monetary goal of \$3,000.00. (As a side note, we had a few extra dollars left after purchasing the new electric piano and bench for the loft area and those funds have now been moved to the Video Ministry Fundraiser.) If you feel led to contribute toward this outreach ministry, please write a check and in the memo area note... God is so great and powerful in finding ways to spread His Word, even during a pandemic!

Update On Re-Opening Plans at Cross of Christ Lutheran Church (Phase 4, as of June 8, 2020)

The Elders and Pastor met for a brief meeting on Monday, June 8th to discuss any updates or concerns with the manner in which we are currently holding worship services. We will continue with the guidelines that everyone MUST wear their own face mask when coming into the church or attending any gathering, for the foreseeable future. Please make sure that the mask covers your whole nose, mouth, and chin areas. The following updates and changes are effective immediately:

PRIVATE COMMUNION...

We will continue with Private Holy Communion on Saturday afternoons, from 1-5 p.m. for the foreseeable future. In addition, Pastor will be available on Wednesday afternoons, starting tomorrow, June 10th, for Private Confession and the distribution of Holy Communion. (This is not a set-aside time like on Saturday's, but Pastor will be available on Wednesday afternoons.) (-cont.)

- TO ATTEND PRIVATE HOLY COMMUNION ON WEDNESDAY OR SATURDAY, YOU WILL NEED TO MAKE A RESERVATION through the church office (877-7747).
 - a. For Wednesday Holy Communion,
 contact the church office no later than
 11 a.m. on Wednesday morning.
 - For Saturday Holy Communion, contact the church office no later than 4 p.m. on Thursday afternoon.
- 3) You will continue to enter and exit through the glass doors of the Sanctuary for <u>any</u> Private Holy Communion service.
- 4) Everyone will stand throughout the whole service (approximately 12 minutes), which is held in the Narthex, but there will be a chair(s) available should it be needed for our elderly or disabled members.
- 5) You can pull down the mask to receive the Lord's Supper and then immediately pull it back up. PLEASE make sure when pulling up the mask that is covers your whole nose, mouth, and chin areas.
- 6) Individual cups and wafers will be used, which will be placed on a separate tray for each communicant to individually pick up, after the Words of Institution. (Pastor will not be picking up the wafer to give to you.)
- 7) Following each private communion, the area will be cleaned and reset for the next communion reservation.

WORSHIP SERVICES...

We ask that you please continue following all guidelines for attending church, previously mentioned in Phases 1-3, for the time being, for the welfare and protection of all members and their families, along with our staff.

- We have increased our attendance numbers per service to 35 people. Depending on attendance, we may need to hold a second service on Sunday's (9:00 and 11:00 am), but that decision has not been made at this time.
- 2) TO ATTEND WORSHIP SERVICES ON SATURDAY EVENING OR SUNDAY MORNING, YOU WILL NEED TO MAKE A RESERVATION through the church office (877-7747) no later than 4:00 p.m. on Thursday afternoon. We are still hoping to distribute our weekend attendance evenly between the Saturday and Sunday services, so please be willing to attend either service. (At this time, worship liturgy will be exactly the same in both services.)
- 3) Continue to enter and exit the church through the glass doors only. This includes EVERYONE... musicians, elders, ushers, organists & pianists, etc...

- The door near the church office will be off limits except to Pastor and Lorilynn.
- 4) Please pick up a service bulletin as you enter the Sanctuary; use the <u>side doors</u> from the Narthex to ENTER and the center aisle doors to EXIT.
- 5) As you ENTER or EXIT the church, you are asked to drop your offerings into the offering plate. The offering plates will not be passed during this time.
- 6) PLEASE do not congregate in the Narthex as you enter or exit the church. Smile, wave, acknowledge friends, but avoid touching, hand shaking, and hugging.
- 7) ALL rooms, hallways, the nursery & library, and the parlor, along with any stairways (except for the organist, video, and sound operators to get to the loft) are OFF LIMITS currently. The water fountains will NOT be available for usage by children or adults.
- 8) The restrooms by the glass doors and the new upstairs handicapped bathroom are the only restrooms available to be used at this time.

OTHER INFORMATION...

SUNDAY SCHOOL... ONLY Adult Bible Class will restart this Sunday, June 14th, with the following changes...

- 1) Adult Bible Class will be held in the Sanctuary. There will be no refreshments offered.
- 2) Those who wish to remain for Bible Class (immediately following the Sunday worship service) can remain in their pew seats. (Feel free to use the restroom or stand up and stretch before we begin.)
- 3) For the next few weeks, we will review the Sunday readings which are not covered in the sermon. (We may or may not meet for a whole hour.)

Pastor will still not be making personal home or nursing home visits at this time, <u>for HIS protection as well as YOURS</u>.

We will continue to broadcast our weekly worship service at 9 a.m. on Sunday mornings, and plans are to continue the broadcasts when we return to our normal weekly services.

Within the last 48 hours of walking into the church for ANY service or meeting: if you have been sick or feel sick; have been in contact with someone who tested positive for COVID-19; or have travelled to a hot spot of COVID-19; please REMAIN AT HOME.

Remember to tell yourself... I am wearing a mask not because I am ill, but because I care for YOUR health. The last thing we want is a resurgence of this silent killer due to someone feeling that they are an exception to the rules. Please know that the Elders are doing everything they can for the health, safety and well-being of our members and your families.

We will continue to evaluate further re-opening plans, taking into consideration the current impact of the virus in our community, and the future steps which can be taken for our church to move forward.

CARES Act Gives You Tax Benefits

Concordia Plan Services has forwarded us some information regarding the Charitable Contribution Incentives for 2020. (These incentives apply to all taxpayers, not just the Concordia Plan members.) Here is the info. that we received which may be of interest to you (also in a more simplified manner without all the legal mumble jumble...)

Note: This document briefly summarizes provisions in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("the CARES Act") that could possibly be of interest to church plans, ministries and plan members. This summary reflects those CARES Act provisions as they are currently understood on March 31, 2020, without any agency guidance. As guidance is issued that may be applicable, we plan to provide information to you on that guidance or to refer you to that guidance, but may not be able to update the summary with that information. This summary is for general information only. It is not a complete analysis and should not be relied upon as legal advice. Please consult your tax adviser for further information.

Thanks to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief & Economic Security Act, otherwise known as the CARES Act, there are some temporary but significant changes in the tax codes to encourage charitable giving.

- > During 2020, each taxpayer can deduct \$300 (or \$600 for a married couple) in annual charitable contributions *without* itemizing.
- > During 2020, individuals who itemize can deduct up to 100% of their annual gross income (up from 60%) for charitable giving.
- > During 2020, corporations can deduct up to 25% of taxable income (up from 10%) for charitable giving.

Charitable Contribution Incentives

Allowance of Partial "Above the Line" Deduction for Charitable Contributions

The provision encourages individuals to contribute to religious, charitable, and educational organizations by creating a new "above the line" deduction (i.e. for taxpayers who take the standard deduction). This deduction will permit them to deduct up to \$300 of annual monetary contributions. This is applicable for tax years beginning after 2019 and does not sunset after 2020 like the increased limits described below.

Modification of Limitations on Charitable Contributions during 2020

The provision increases the limitations on deductions for charitable contributions by individuals who itemize, as well as corporations. Such cash contributions must be made during 2020, and this provision does not extend the due date of the 2020 tax return. For individuals, the 60-percent of adjusted gross income limitation is suspended for cash contributions made in 2020. For corporations, the 10percent limitation is increased to 25 percent of taxable income for cash contributions made in 2020. This provision also increases the limitation on deductions from 15-percent 25-percent of income for net food donations made during 2020.

After reading the above, there is no better time than the present to start planning for your 2020 tax filing, before the end of the year and before tax time rolls around next year! Your tax-deductible gift today will go farther than ever in 2020!!

FACE MASKS AVAILABLE! CHILDREN'S, WOMEN'S, AND MEN'S SIZES

At Saturday and Sunday worship services, there will be a box on the bench in the Narthex with various mask sizes. Each large bag is labeled with the type of masks within the bag (men, women, and one size for small children...ages 3-6 yrs.). Please do not open the individual bags (inside the large bag) unless you are buying that particular mask. We are asking for \$1.00 per mask, but many are adding in a little extra -- paying it forward -- to help cover basic costs of the masks.

THE "WOW!" **FACTOR**

After the final notes concluded at a recent symphony performance in Boston, the conductor hadn't yet lowered his baton when a child exclaimed, "Wow!" The break in protocol, magnified by excellent acoustics, didn't upset the participants or audience, however. Instead, several later said it brought them great joy. One even called the moment life-changing.

The incident was especially meaningful because the child, a 9-year-old named Ronan, has autism and is generally nonverbal. Music, his family says, tends to attract his interest and make him happy. When symphony officials learned Ronan's identity, they arranged a private performance so he could meet some musicians.

How often do you shout "Wow!" — in a good way - at what you see and hear? You may tend to do so on vacation or while observing God's natural wonders, but what about during your day-to-day life? Think about the people you encounter and their talents — and your own. When have these sparked a "Wow!" of thanks to God?

Every blessing, large or small, is a wow-moment — a gift from God that warrants our praise.
